

OSRD BEST PRACTICES IN THE SRPEDD REGION



Municipal bylaws offer examples within the SRPEDD region of best practice factors that support OSRD-type zoning for low-impact and environmentally conscious development. The zoning code in which the best practice factors are supported provide a reference point for communities interested in adopting OSRD bylaws to support conservation development strategies in the region.

The following community bylaws support Mass Audubon's best practice factors for OSRD-type development:

Best Practice Factor 2: Land Area to which the OSRD Zoning is Applicable

- Best Practice All Developable Land is Zoned Residential
- Community Examples: Attleboro, Dartmouth, Dighton, Mansfield, Marion Mattapoisett, Middleborough, Norton, Rochester, Somerset, Swansea, Wareham, & Westport

Best Practice Factor 4: Yield Calculation

- Best Practice None
- While no community in the SRPEDD region meets the best practice factor, **Marion** provides the requirement of sketch plans with percolation tests, which Mass Audubon describes as a better option.

Best Practice Factor 5: Minimum Parcel Sizes

- Best Practice None
- Community Examples: Dartmouth, Marion, Rochester, Taunton (These communities do not have minimum parcel sizes explicitly stated within their zoning bylaws.

Best Practice Factor 6: Review Process (Open Space Selection)

- Best Practice Flexible "OSRD" 4-Step Process, Prioritizing Selection of Open Space First
- Community Examples: Attleboro, Carver, Dartmouth, Dighton, Marion, Seekonk, Swansea, & Westport

Best Practice Factor 7: Ownership of Open Space

- Best Practice Appropriate to the Resources Present (Examples: agricultural land by the farmer, watershed land by a water dept. or district, habitat land by the conservation commission, or recreational open space by a parks and recreation commission or homeowners association)
- Community Examples: Freetown

Best Practice Factor 8: Dimensional Standards (per Individual Lot Created); Area, Frontage, etc.

- Best Practice None or Set Small Minimums
- Community Examples: Dartmouth, Dighton, Marion, & Rochester

Best Practice Factor 9: Quality of Open Space Conserved (i.e. Specific Criteria, Maps or Local Priorities Identified for Natural, Cultural, and Historic Resource Conservation)

- Best Practice Local Priorities Clearly and Unambiguously Stated and Mapped for Use in Site Design
- Community Examples: Marion & Swansea

Best Practice Factor 10: Contiguity of Open Space; Relationship to Previously Protected Open Space

- Best Practice Contiguity Required; Adjacent Land Considered
- Community Examples: Dartmouth, Marion, Swansea, & Westport

Best Practice Factor 11: Quality of Open Space Conserved: Allowed Uses of Open Space

- Best Practice Clear List of Allowed Uses is Consistent with Conservation and Recreation Goals
- Community Examples: Swansea, Wareham, & Westport

Best Practice Factor 12: Quality of Open Space Conserved: Submission Requirements Include GIS maps, Data, etc. to Inform the Review Process

- Best Practice Specific Plans, Maps, & Comprehensive Data Regarding Natural, Cultural, and Historic Resources Required and Used as the Basis for Open Space Conservation
- Community Examples: Attleboro, Marion,, Middleborough, & Rochester

Best Practice Factor 13: Relationship to Plans

- Best Practice Required Consideration of Open Space Goals of OSRP, Master, and/or Regional Policy Plan
- Community Examples: Dartmouth, Freetown, Swansea

Best Practice Factor 14: Low Impact Development (LID)

- Best Practice Required
- Community Examples: Freetown, Marion, Swansea, Wareham, Westport

Best Practice Factor 15: Density Bonus for Enhanced Public Benefit(s)

- Best Practice Automatic or Formulaic Bonus
- Community Examples: Attleboro, Marion, Mattapoisett, Rochester, Seekonk

Best Practice Factor 16: Review Entity

- Best Practice The Planning Board and Other Departments are Required to Review OSRD Plan
- Community Examples: Attleboro, Freetown, & Mansfield

Best Practice Factor 18: Monitoring and/or Maintenance of Open Space

- Best Practice Specific Provisions to Aid Endowed Monitoring by a Conservation Organization at Stated Intervals
- Community Examples: Mansfield

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
