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Chapter 1 - Introduction

1.1 PURPOSE

The Southeastern Massachusetts Metropolitan Planning Organization (SMMPO) is committed to ensuring that individuals with limited English proficiency¹ (LEP) are not discriminated against and have equal access to meaningfully participate in the programs, activities, and services it offers. This Language Assistance Plan (LAP) outlines how SMMPO staff assess language needs, implement language services that ensure meaningful access to transportation planning, and communicate information about these services in a way that does not impose excessive burdens on SMMPO resources.

Engaging the public in a meaningful way is a key responsibility of the SMMPO. This LAP is intended to fulfill federal requirements and aids the SMMPO staff in creating and implementing public engagement strategies, as outlined in the SMMPO's Public Participation Plan.

1.2 FEDERAL REGULATORY BACKGROUND

As a recipient of federal funding from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), the SMMPO is required to comply with federal civil rights statutes.

Section 601 of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. Section 2000d, et seq. states: "No person in the United States shall on the ground of race, color or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to, discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance." In this context, LEP is often an indicator of national origin.

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act requires MPOs to provide individuals with LEP meaningful access to our programs, activities, and services. To meet these responsibilities, the SMMPO has created a LAP in accordance with guidance from the USDOT and FTA. The U.S. DOT's "Safe Harbor" provision states that the translation of vital written materials is necessary if a language group makes up 5% or 1000 individuals, whichever is less, of the total population being served or affected by a program. The SMMPO staff is committed

to reviewing new language data as it becomes available, minimally every two years, and updating this LAP as needed. As outlined in FTA Circular 4702.1B, the LAP evaluates four key factors to assess the language needs of individuals with LEP who are served by the SMMPO:

- Factor 1: The number and proportion of LEP person in the service area
- Factor 2: The frequency with which LEP individuals come in contact with the program, activity, or service.
- Factor 3: The nature and importance of the program, activity, or service provided by the recipient to people's lives
- Factor 4: The resources available to the recipient and overall cost.

Chapter 2 – Language Needs

The first two factors of the four-factor analysis help identify individuals who require language assistance, while the other two factors determine the necessary measures for providing that assistance.

2.1 FACTOR 1: NUMBER AND PROPORTION OF LEP PERSONS IN THE SMMPO REGION

The first factor considers the number and proportion of LEP individuals in the SMMPO region. The larger the number or proportion of LEP individuals speaking a specific language within the service population, the more likely it is that language assistance will be necessary. The translation of vital written materials is required if any of the LEP language or language groups reach the LEP threshold of 5%, or the Safe Harbor threshold of 1,000 individuals, of the total population being served or affected by a program, whichever is less. Reaching or exceeding this threshold signals that language assistance is needed for those individuals.

Previous Language Assistance Plans (LAPs) utilized American Community Survey (ACS) data to identify the languages spoken by individuals with Limited English Proficiency (LEP) within the SMMPO region. Beginning with the 2016 ACS, the U.S. Census Bureau revised how non-English languages spoken at home are reported. As a result of changes to data coding and privacy protections, new languages are listed, while others have been grouped into broader language families.

These broader language families pose a challenge in the SMMPO region, where languages such as Portuguese is now aggregated under the "Other Indo-European Languages" category. This change is especially significant given that Fall River, New Bedford, and Taunton are home to some of the largest Portuguese-speaking communities in the country. To address these constraints, staff supplemented ACS data by gathering language information from additional sources to gain a more comprehensive understanding of language needs in the SMMPO region.

2.1.1 DATA SOURCES

2018-2022 American Community Survey

Using ACS data tables C16001² and C16002³, MPO staff calculated and mapped the percentage of

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


Figure 1: Individuals Age 5+ with Limited English Proficiency by Census Tract and Dot Density (Table C16001)




Figure 2: LEP Households by Census Block Group and Dot Density (Table C16002)

LEP individuals and households at the census tract, block group, and municipal levels. A regional average is determined and used as a threshold: any census track, block group, or municipality exceeding this average is identified as containing LEP populations. To ensure no outlying data is overlooked, aggregate maps were also created for a more comprehensive analysis (Figures 1 and 2). Appendix A includes LEP calculations based on Census tables C16001 and C16002.

To identify Safe Harbor languages in the SMMPO region, the total and overall percentage of LEP individuals and households was calculated. Based on data from Census Table C16001 (Table 1), the Safe Harbor languages/language families include: Other Indo-European languages, Spanish, French, Haitian or Cajun, and Other Asian and Pacific Island languages. Census Table C16002 (Table 2), which is limited to four broad language groups to protect individual privacy at the block group level, identifies Spanish and Other Indo-European languages as Safe Harbor languages.

Because two of the identified Safe Harbor languages—Other Indo-European languages and Other Asian and Pacific Island languages—are broad language families, additional data sources were used to better determine the specific languages they may represent. SMMPO staff consulted Public Use Microdata Sample (PUMS) data provided by the Census and used the District Analysis Review Tool (DART) for English Learners provided by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE).

Public Use Microdata Sample (PUMS)

The Public Use Microdata Sample (PUMS) is based on the same ACS data collected from individual people and housing units but offers more detailed information, including a wider range of languages than those listed in the previously mentioned ACS tables. To protect privacy, disclosure safeguards are applied to ensure that individuals or households cannot be identified.

Public Use Microdata Areas (PUMAs) are non-overlapping, statistical geographic areas that partition each state or equivalent entity into geographic areas containing no fewer than 100,000 people each. The map below highlights the six PUMAs within the SMMPO region. With the exception of the Norfolk County PUMA, most of these areas lie entirely within SMMPO boundaries.




Figure 3: Public Use Microdata Areas (PUMA)

Using ACS Table B16001⁴, MPO staff calculated the percentage of LEP individuals at the PUMA level. While an average for each PUMA was calculated, it is not used as a threshold for identifying LEP PUMAs, given that each PUMA includes a wide range of communities. The highest percentages and number of LEP individuals are found in the Bristol County South, Bristol County Central, and Bristol County—Taunton, Easton, Mansfield PUMAs. This aligns with expectations, as these areas include Fall River, New Bedford, and Taunton—the three largest cities in the SMMPO region. Appendix A provides LEP population estimates based on Census Table B16001 at the PUMA level.




Figure 4: LEP Individuals Age 5+ by PUMA Geographic Areas (Table B16001)

PUMA level data helps provide a broader understanding of the specific languages that may fall within the general categories of "Other Indo-European languages" and "Other Asian and Pacific Island languages." Although PUMAs cover large areas—sometimes including communities outside the SMMPO region—they offer valuable insight into detailed language representation that may be overlooked when relying solely on Census tract or block group-level data.

The following table highlights Portuguese, Spanish, Haitian Creole, Chinese (including Mandarin and Cantonese), and Vietnamese as the most spoken languages among LEP populations within the PUMA geographies. This data suggests that the "Other Indo-European languages" category in the previously mentioned Census tables likely includes Portuguese, while the "Other Asian and Pacific Island languages" category likely includes Chinese (including Mandarin and Cantonese). Apart from the Norfolk County PUMA—which includes only Plainville from the SMMPO region—Portuguese and Spanish consistently and overwhelmingly rank as the top two languages across the remaining PUMAs.

Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE)

The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) developed a suite of tools known as the District Analysis Review Tool (DART). One component, the English Learners Data Dashboard (DART for EL), consolidates statewide data on English Language Learner (ELL) students into a single, user-friendly platform. This tool includes data for all school districts, including single school districts. Within the SMMPO region, most municipalities have a single school district. However, there are also nine regional school districts, with the towns of Bridgewater and Easton located outside the SMMPO boundary.

DESE defines an English Language Learner as "a student whose first language is a language other than English and who is unable to perform ordinary classroom work in English⁵." While not a direct match to the U.S. Department of Transportation's (USDOT) definition of LEP, it is reasonable to assume that ELL students often come from households where parents or guardians also have limited English proficiency. This data provides valuable insight into areas with potential language access needs—especially at smaller geographic scales—supporting more effective and targeted public outreach by MPO staff.




Figure 5: ELL Percentage by Municipal School Districts (DESE DART for EL)




Figure 6: Regional School Districts in the SMMPO Region

Based on 2024–2025 school enrollment data from DART for EL, 10.2% of students (9,008 out of 88,077) in the SMMPO region were identified as English language learners. Appendix A provides a breakdown of ELL totals by school district. Figure 5 below shows the percentage of ELL students in municipal school districts. Figure 6 displays the nine regional school districts, all of which had 5% or less English language learners.

Based on the data from DART for EL, the most commonly spoken languages for the 2024-2025 school year were Spanish, Portuguese, and Haitian Creole (Table 4). Spanish is the most widely spoken language (5%), followed by Portuguese (2%) and Creole (Haitian) (1%). As expected, this data aligns with the previously mentioned PUMA and Census data.

Across all data sources, it is evident that Spanish is among the most spoken languages. While Census tables C16001 and C16002 group Portuguese under "Other Indo-European languages," data from DESE and PUMA allow MPO staff to determine that Portuguese and Haitian Creole are also widely spoken. Taking a holistic approach by considering all four data sources provides a more comprehensive understanding of the region's Limited English Proficiency languages. Based on this analysis, the SMMPO staff has identified Spanish, Portuguese, and Creole (Haitian, French and Cajun), as the region's Safe Harbor languages. However, staff also recognizes the

existence and importance of other languages, such as Chinese and Vietnamese. When planning outreach, translating materials, and conducting demographic analyses, staff are committed to taking into consideration the specific geographic area, consulting the aforementioned data sources, and drawing on local knowledge from community partners to make informed decisions about which languages to include.

2.2 FACTOR 2: Frequency of Contact with LEP Persons

Factor 2 examines how often individuals with Limited English Proficiency (LEP) interact with an organization's programs, activities, and services. The MPO communicates with the public through various channels, including the SRPEDD website, email mailings, social media (Facebook, Instagram, LinkedIn, YouTube), surveys, listening sessions, focus groups, and local community events.

Contact with LEP individuals most frequently happens during local public events attended by MPO staff, including community festivals, farmers markets and resource fairs. MPO staff also engage with LEP individuals when hosting focus groups with them in partnership with partner community-based organizations.

To date the most commonly encountered languages are Portuguese and Spanish.

Examples of interactions with LEP communities include:

- During a high school orientation event attended in partnership with the Greater Attleboro Taunton Regional Transit Authority (GATRA), staff communicated with Portuguese-speaking LEP individuals to assist in navigating their children's bus schedule.
- Bilingual MPO staff connected with over 20 LEP individuals while tabling at two local events in Fall River, communicating with Portuguese-speaking residents about walkability in their native language, and sharing translated flyers and content with Spanish- and Chinese-speaking residents.
- In partnership with the Community Economic Development Center and a community interpreter, MPO staff co-hosted a focus group in Spanish with Spanish and K'iche-speaking individuals in New Bedford during the region's Safety Action Plan engagement process.

The MPO maintains regular contact and engages in ongoing conversations with social service organizations and advocates throughout the region to better understand the key issues affecting LEP populations. These advocates include organizations such as the Community Economic Development Center, Black Bristol Collective, The Literacy Center, and the Taunton Together Youth Program, among others. The MPO actively and regularly seeks input from a range of stakeholders, including community groups, transit and transportation providers, councils on aging, businesses, educational institutions, etc.

2.3 FACTOR 3: Nature and Importance of the Service to LEP Persons

SMMPO staff are responsible for planning and funding transportation projects, as well as conducting studies throughout the Southeastern Massachusetts region. Although staff does not directly provide transportation services or implement improvements, the outcomes of its planning efforts significantly influence the quality of life for all residents.

Through the SMMPO's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) process, projects are evaluated using the SMMPO's Evaluation Criteria, which scores each project based on regionally prioritized factors. Projects selected for federal funding are generally initiated by municipalities, state transportation agencies, and regional transit authorities. These agencies maintain their own policies to ensure that individuals with LEP have meaningful opportunities to participate in the public engagement process. The SMMPO directs its language assistance efforts toward work tasks and activities that are supported by MPO funding.

Public input is essential to the transportation planning process, and the SMMPO staff is committed to comprehensive and effective public engagement. Every effort is made to ensure that the public understands the planning process and consistently provides opportunities for community members to share their feedback and perspectives.

Three of the SMMPO's most significant public engagement efforts center on the development of its core certification documents: the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), and the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). Each of these documents includes dedicated public meetings, outreach events, and a 30-day public comment period.

During the development of the RTP—a long-range strategy document guiding the development and maintenance of transportation infrastructure over a 20+ year period —SMMPO staff launched an extensive outreach campaign. This effort included multiple public open houses, multilingual surveys, informational videos, and live webinars to maximize participation and accessibility.

Public engagement is also conducted for specific planning efforts, such as the Evacuation Route Study and the Regional Pedestrian Plan. In addition, recurring opportunities for public input are available through forums like the Southeast Regional Coordinating Council on Transportation (SERCCOT) meetings, where general transportation issues are discussed.

These activities establish formal processes to ensure that individuals with LEP have meaningful opportunities to participate in the SMMPO's planning processes. The development and maintenance of relationships with LEP communities—and the organizations that represent them—remain ongoing priorities. Through sustained engagement, SMMPO staff are able to build trust, gain a deeper understanding of community needs, promote transparency, and ensure that LEP individuals are included early and consistently in transportation planning efforts.

2.4 FACTOR 4: Resources Available and Overall Cost

The SMMPO has allocated funding to support the translation of vital documents into the Safe Harbor languages identified above, as well as additional languages as needed for public outreach or in response to specific requests. Despite operating within budgetary constraints, the MPO has consistently fulfilled all language assistance needs, including the translation of documents, flyers, and other outreach materials.

Available translated resources include, but are not limited to, the SRPEDD website, which features a built-in translation tool; a variety of outreach materials such as flyers, bookmarks, and postcards; surveys translated into all Safe Harbor languages; and translated meeting notices.

It is policy to provide translation and interpreter services upon request for all MPO-sponsored meetings. While the availability of these services has been regularly advertised, no formal requests have been made to date. Nevertheless, as the SMMPO region—and Massachusetts as a whole—continues to become more linguistically and culturally diverse, the MPO remains committed to monitoring the need for language services. The MPO will continue to assess the need for translation services based on the first three elements of this Four-Factor analysis, as well as the volume of requests received. In addition, SMMPO staff will periodically review its current policy to determine whether adjustments are necessary in response to budgetary constraints.

Chapter 3 – Providing Language Assistance

As outlined in Chapter 2, approximately 7% of individuals—or 5% of households—within the SMMPO region have limited proficiency in reading, speaking, writing, or understanding English. In response, the SMMPO has proactively implemented measures to ensure meaningful access for LEP individuals by routinely making interpreter services and translated materials available.

3.1 Oral Language Assistance

The SMMPO provides interpreter services upon request, and all meeting notices include information on how to request such services. Additionally, meeting notices are either fully translated or contain information translated into each of the Safe Harbor languages identified above. The MPO also benefits from having several bilingual staff members fluent in Portuguese, Spanish, and French, who have, on multiple occasions, communicated directly with LEP individuals during public meetings and outreach events, despite no formal interpretation requests. The MPO also collaborates with community-based organizations who serve LEP populations in its public engagement activities and benefits from multilingual community partners' language assistance when necessary.

For specific outreach events or public meetings where the presence of LEP individuals is anticipated, MPO staff proactively assess potential language needs by reviewing ACS and DESE language data, and by consulting with local partners and community organizations.

For telephone calls, the SMMPO contracts with Language Line, a service that provides ondemand phone interpreter services in over 170 languages. All staff members have been instructed on how to use this service and have been provided with an instruction sheet.

3.2 Written Language Assistance

The MPO provides written translations of vital documents into the Safe Harbor languages, including the Notice to Beneficiaries of Title VI Rights, the associated Complaint Process, and Complaint Forms. Public outreach materials and surveys are routinely translated into the Safe Harbor languages, or into other languages relevant to the specific LEP populations where the public outreach is taking place. Information on who to contact for language accommodations is provided on public meeting notices in the specified languages.

Other key documents—such as the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP), and the Title VI Plan— may be translated, upon request, contingent upon available funding.

3.3 SRPEDD Website

To support website accessibility for individuals with limited English proficiency, the SRPEDD website features an integrated Google Translate tool that allows users to view content in over 100 languages, including all Safe Harbor languages relevant to the SMMPO region.

Chapter 4 – Monitoring and Updating

SMMPO staff actively monitor the evolving language needs of the region and will adjust language assistance services as necessary. In support of this effort, staff continually seek out new data sources to gain a better understanding of the linguistic diversity within the SMMPO region's population. Efforts to strengthen engagement with individuals with Limited English Proficiency, as well as with the community-based organizations that serve them, remain an ongoing priority.

The SMMPO will review U.S. Census language data every two years and Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education data annually to inform its language access strategy. This Language Assistance Plan is an integral component of the SMMPO's Title VI Program and will be updated accordingly. Should a significant change in the region's LEP population be identified, the LAP will be revised to reflect those changes in a timely manner.
